### **ANTI-POVERTY ACTION PLAN AND ANNUAL REPORT 2021**

## **Report of Assistant Director of Customer Services**

## 1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1 The Annual Report for 2021 recognises the continued impact of Covid 19 on our communities and the inequalities that we face. It features six case studies covering key areas of focus: family poverty, fuel poverty, signposting vulnerable residents, unemployment, debt and mental health.
- 1.2 In Calderdale we recognise that tackling Poverty requires a partnership response and a wide range of partner organisations are involved in the delivery of our agreed action plan. The economic impact of the pandemic will take many years to recover from and our focus towards our vision means we will do all we can to address these challenges.
- 1.3 Tackling poverty is key to realising Calderdale's Vision 2024 and delivering our Inclusive Economic Recovery Plan, building back fairer and for Calderdale to always be a place where you can realise your potential whoever you are.
- 1.4 Tackling inequality is key to realising Cabinet's key priorities. Data shows that people living in poverty have been more severely affected by the Covid-19 pandemic than people not living in poverty. Services have reported that cases are more complex and more than ever require a joined up response.

#### 2. Need for a decision

2.1 The delivery of agreed actions is key to achieving our Vision 2024 and Cabinet Priority of reducing inequalities and the causes of deprivation.

#### 3. Recommendation

- 3.1 Cabinet is asked to:
- 3.2 Note the report and agree that the work of the Anti-Poverty Steering Group continue for a further 12 months.
- 3.3 Give approval for officers to continue to review and update the relevant sections of the action plan over the next 12 months to ensure that we focus our resources where they will have greatest impact on the people who are in greatest need.

## 4. Background and/or details

- 4.1 The first version of the Anti-Poverty Action Plan was agreed by Cabinet in December 2018. Since then the Anti-Poverty Steering Group has continued to focus on the key themes of **Prevention, Intervention and Resilience.**
- 4.2 An Action Plan is agreed each year that Partners work to deliver against. A significant review took place in the first half of the year following a large partnership event in February. Outcomes Indicators are measured and are attached at Appendix 1.
- 4.3 The partnership event explored the impact of Covid-19 on poverty and inequalities in Calderdale. Over 80 people attended the event and took part in workshops organised into the life stages (starting well, developing well, living well, working well and ageing well). The event film can be viewed on the Council's YouTube channel.
- 4.4 The Anti-Poverty <u>Dashboard</u> has 26 datasets in total and provides a valuable evidence base for further developing our joint response as well as providing strong evidence for funding applications.
- 4.5 This year the steering group has also highlighted 12 key indicators in the action plan. Lead officers will develop a narrative (a story behind the data) against each indicator to assess progress and inform future priorities and planning.
- 4.6 Within the annual report a case study approach has been adopted to provide richer qualitative information alongside some key statistical data. The case studies clearly illustrate how the lives of individuals and families have improved through the actions of the Council and partner organisations. This year the steering group decided to produce short films to communicate the case studies visually and these have been linked to the Council's YouTube page.
- 4.7 Over the next twelve months, we will continue to focus on the areas detailed in the Action Plan. Our next partnership event will be held in the autumn and focus on giving every child the best start in life. Following the event we will undertake a further review of the action plan to ensure it maintains focus on key areas of concern.
- 4.12 The loss of household income caused by the pandemic and the removal of the £20 Universal Credit uplift is likely to have a huge strain on families, with impacts on physical and mental wellbeing. 22,060 families are in receipt of UC in Calderdale. This is an area that will be prioritised.
- 4.13 On 30<sup>th</sup> September Government announced a new Household Support Fund to be administrated by Local Authorities to help vulnerable households this winter. The Fund will run from 6<sup>th</sup> October 2021 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022 and support households in the most need with food, energy, water and other essential costs. Local Authorities have discretion as to how to manage the fund, within the eligibility criteria set out by Department for Work and Pensions. Calderdale's allocation is £1,833,003.46 and a local scheme has been agreed.

4.14 The annual report and action plan will be published on our Anti-Poverty webpage.

## 5. Options considered

- 5.1 Continue and build on our partnership approach to poverty and to seek new ways and opportunities to strengthen our joint co-ordinated action through effective use of resources. This option is recommended.
- 5.2 Cease partnership working and risk duplication of effort and an uncoordinated response to the issues, risking higher levels of poverty and inequality. This option is not recommended.

## 6. Financial implications

- 6.1 The funding profile is complex, and work is often embedded into wider service budgets covering housing, education, employment and health & wellbeing. A number of actions are also delivered by partner organisations through a variety of funding sources.
- 6.2 The <u>Council's Advice Grants Programme</u> of £75,000 per year supports a range of local VCS organisations to support the financial resilience of local people across the Borough, with debt and budgeting advice.
- 6.3 The Council also has a contract with Citizens Advice Bureau to provide advice and support services, which costs £295,000 per year until April 2022. Future re-commissioning will be subject to a Cabinet decision in November 2021.
- 6.4 The welfare assistance scheme helped 234 households from April to August 2021, a significant increase on the same period in the previous two years. This budget of £95,000 annually is used to support people in financial emergencies to pay for food and fuel and also to provide essential furniture and white goods to those who may be returning to the community after being in care and to ease exceptional pressure on families. The scheme was supplemented with £100,000 from the DEFRA emergency food and essential supplies grant in 2020/21, to ensure we could support those people impacted financially by Covid.
