The Roman Coins Found By Children.

The Roman Coins Found By Children.

The Council of the Yorkshire Archæological Society has issued a further "Journal," in which principal attention is drawn to the discovery of 1,075 coins on the Rocks last May. Probably they were originally hidden in a bag of leather or some other portable material. With one exception all belong to the period 330-345 A.D. Other Roman coins have been found in Halifax, but this is the richest local hoard on record, though at Wakefield in 1905 no fewer than 7,000 coins were uncovered in ploughing. A full description is given of the coins.

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
